### RB 71 Mutual Obedience (RB 71:1-5)

<sup>1</sup>The **blessing of obedience** is not only something that everyone ought to show to the **prioress**, but the members should also **obey one another**. <sup>2</sup>They know that they will **go to God by this path of obedience**. <sup>3</sup>Therefore, except for an order of the prioress or subprioress that no private command is to override, <sup>4</sup>**all must obey** one another in **mutual obedience** with **every mark of loving** attention. <sup>5</sup>Anyone found **objecting to this** should be reproved.

### RB 71:6-9 Moves back to hierarchical obedience

elders, even for some very small matter, <sup>7</sup>or gets the impression that one of the elders is angry or disturbed with them, however slightly, <sup>8</sup>that member must, then and there without delay, fall down on the ground at the other's feet to make satisfaction, and lie there until the disturbance is calmed by a blessing. <sup>9</sup>Anyone who refuses to do this should be subjected to corporal punishment, or if stubborn, should be expelled from the monastery.

RB 69-71 are 3 chapters that all deal with **fraternal relations** 

■ RB 69-70 discuss 2 abuses of communal life

## RB 71 presents communal life in its ideal form, namely, mutual obedience

- The chapter begins with mutual obedience but soon veers off into other possible abuses of obedience.
- It ends with a harsh condemnation of those who fail to make satisfaction for offenses against mutual obedience.
- Benedict's pattern of ideal beginnings and harsh endings repeat itself
- RB 71: 1 At the beginning of the monastic life, obedience is indeed a "labor", but if this central cenobitic value is sufficiently internalized, then one can come to love obedience as a "blessing"
- RB 5 dealt with ascetical aspects of obedience, now the focus is on its communal dimensions. The purpose of RB 5 was to further the spiritual growth of the individual monastic by reducing ego; now the mutual obedience is to bind the community closer together in Christian love

RB 71:1 "prioress"—Benedict sets out to discuss mutual obedience, but he is well aware that the **dominant form of obedience is hierarchical** 

 Benedict's preoccupation with rank will take him completely off the track of his subject and eventually lead him to exaggerated claims for hierarchical obedience

"one another"—equality and mutuality have come up at times in RB
